# A YEAR OF HONORS



Barrier Free Living (BFL) received a 2022 Purple Ribbon Award from DomesticShelters.org for Innovative Services at its programs for survivors of domestic violence with disabilities.



Barrier Free Living received the National Crime Victims' Service Award for Professional Innovation in Victim Services at a ceremony held April 29 at Constitution Gardens National Park.



In 2022 Governor Kathy Hochul announced a \$6.9 million award for Barrier Free Living's newest vision - Freedom Village in Manhattan's Bowery neighborhood.

# PROGRAMS & PROJECTS



#### **BFLA**

Work began in 2022 on the renovation of a learning center for the kids at BFL's supportive housing program in the Bronx. BFL works with as many as 120 children a day at its programs.



#### **SECRET GARDEN**

The Secret Garden answered over 3500 hotline calls in 2022 and served an average of 260 clients

On average, 50 clients were assisted with rental arrears to provide security and avoid eviction and 10 clients were able to move into their new apartments.



#### **FREEDOM HOUSE**

F.R.E.E financial empowerment workshops resumed online; volunteers successfully collaborated with residents by offering individual consultations to provide education on strategies to increase credit scores, create budgets, and answer any financial-related questions.

#### SECRET GARDEN

Secret Garden received an OVW continuation award for 2022-2025 to provide sexual assault individual counsleing and groups to survivors.

Lucy, the sexual assualt coordinator at Secret
Garden (pictured above) provided direct services to 32 individuals in 2022.
While all clients identified as having a disability, about 40% of clients identified as having multiple disabilities.
All clients have at least one form of disability that resulted directly from intimate partner violence.
